Songbirds rely on light from the moon and stars to guide them to their wintering grounds.

Artificial light from homes and buildings attracts and disorients birds, causing them to stray from their natural migration path.

Landing in a busy downtown can mean a tragic end to their journey.

Reducing light at night saves birds. Please be a good neighbor to our migratory friends:

- Turn off nonessential lights between 11 p.m. 6 a.m.
- Direct lighting downward, instead of upward into the sky.
- Switch floodlights to timed lights or motion sensor lights.
- Reduce lobby and atrium lighting, where possible,
- Turn off interior lighting, especially on upper floors.
- Use task lighting or close blinds to reduce the amount of light coming from windows.
- **VOLUNTEER** to help us protect migratory birds in Jacksonville.
